

#### Important:

This apparatus is supplied with an approved moulded 13A plug. To change a fuse in this type of plug proceed as follows:

- 1 Remove fuse cover and fuse.
- 2 Fit new fuse which should be a BS 1362 5A,A.S.T.A. or BSI approved type.
- 3 Refit the fuse cover.


If the fitted plug is not suitable for your socket outlets, it should be cut off and an appropriate 3-pin plug fitted in its place.

If the mains plug contains a fuse, this should have a value of 5A. If a plug without a fuse is used, the fuse at the distribution board should not be greater than 5A.

The severed plug must be destroyed to avoid a possible shock hazard should it be inserted into a 13A socket elsewhere.



#### How to connect a plug

The wires in the mains lead are coloured in accordance with the following code:

BLUE - "NEUTRAL" ("N") BROWN - "LIVE" ("L") GREEN & YELLOW - "EARTH" ("E")

- The GREEN & YELLOW wire must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter "E" or by the Earth symbol or coloured GREEN or GREEN & YELLOW.
- The BLUE wire must be connected to the terminal which is marked with the letter "N" or coloured BLACK.

• The BROWN wire must be connected to the terminal which marked with the letter "L" or coloured RED. Before replacing the plug cover, make certain that the cord grip is clamped over the sheath of the lead - not simply over the three wires.

### **Cautions When Setting Up**

- Do not place the interactive display near heat sources, such as a heater, exhaust vent, or in direct sunlight.
- Do not cover or block the ventilation holes in the housing.
- Place the interactive display on a stable area. Do not place the interactive display where it may subject to vibration or shock.
- Place the interactive display in a well-ventilated area.
- Do not place the interactive display outdoors.
- To avoid the risk of shock or permanent damage to the set, do not expose the display to dust, rain, water or an excessively moist environment.

### **Cautions When Using**

- Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not place the interactive display where the power cord may be stepped on.
- If the interactive display will not be used for an indefinite period of time, unplug the power cord from the power outlet.
- To disconnect the power cord, grasp and pull by the plug head. Do not tug on the cord; doing so may cause fire or electric shock.
- Do not unplug or touch the power cord with wet hands.
- When turning off the display by detaching the power cord, wait 6 seconds before re-attaching the power cord for normal operation.
- Do not knock or drop the display during operation or transportation.

### **Cleaning and Maintenance**

- To protect your display from possible damage, do not put excessive pressure on the LCD panel. When moving your display, grasp the frame to lift; do not lift the display by placing your hand or fingers on the LCD panel.
- For cleaning the touch screen, refer to page 9.
- If your display becomes wet, wipe it with dry cloth as soon as possible.
- If a foreign substance or water gets in your display, turn the power off immediately and disconnect the power cord. Then remove the foreign substance or water, and send the unit to the maintenance center.
- In order to maintain the best performance of your display and ensure a longer lifetime, we strongly recommend using the display in a location that falls within the following temperature and humidity ranges.

# PRECAUTIONS

### Notice for the Interactive Display

- In order to maintain the stable luminous performance, it is recommended to use low brightness setting.
- Due to the lifespan of the lamp, it is normal that the brightness quality of the interactive display may decrease with time.
- When static images are displayed for long periods of time, the image may cause an imprint on the interactive display. This is called image retention or burn-in.
  - To prevent image retention, do any of the following:
    - Set the interactive display to turn off after a few minutes of being idle.
    - Use a screen saver that has moving graphics or a blank white image.
    - · Switch desktop backgrounds regularly.
    - · Adjust the interactive display to low brightness settings.
    - Turn off the interactive display when the system is not in use.
  - Things to do when the interactive display shows image retention:
    - Turn off the interactive display for extended periods of time. It can be several hours or several days.
    - Use a screen saver and run it for extended periods of time.
    - Use a black and white image and run it for extended periods of time.
- There are millions of micro transistors inside the interactive display. It is normal for a few transistors to be damaged and to produce spots. This is acceptable and is not considered a failure.
- **IMPORTANT**: Always activate a moving screen saver program when you leave your display unattended. Always activate a periodic screen refresh application if the unit will display unchanging static content. Uninterrupted display of still or static images over an extended period may cause "burn in", also known as "after-imaging" or "ghost imaging", on your screen. This is a well-known phenomenon in LCD panel technology. In most cases, the "burned in" or "after-imaging" or "ghost imaging" will disappear gradually over a period of time after the power has been switched off.
- **WARNING**: Severe "burn-in" or "after-image" or "ghost image" symptoms will not disappear and cannot be repaired. This is also not covered under the terms of your warranty.

### **Caring for the Touch Screen**

Use the following recommendations to care for the touch screen.

- Before cleaning the screen, make sure the interactive display is switched off and the power cord is unplugged from the wall outlet.
- Remove dirt or dust from the screen regularly. It is recommended to use a small amount of alcohol as cleaning agent.
- To avoid damage to the screen, never use any aggressive solvents or scrubbing agents.
- Wipe the screen gently using a lint-free cloth moistened in the cleaning agent.
- Never spray the cleaning agent on the screen surface or the body directly as it may cause short circuit to the touch screen.
- Do not expose the display to direct sunlight or strong light source during use.


# **CHAPTER 1: PRODUCT DESCRIPTION**

# 1.1 Unpacking

- This product is packed in a packaging box which contains standard accessories.
- · Any other optional accessories will be packed separately.
- Considering the size and weight of the display, it is recommended that this product is carried out by two persons.
- After opening the packaging box, ensure that the included items are in good condition and complete.

# 1.2 Package Contents

When unpacking, check if the following items are included in the package. If any of them is missing or damaged, contact your dealer.



- Remote control is shipped with the supplied AAA batteries.
- For all other regions, apply a power cord that conforms to the AC voltage of the power socket and has been approved by and complies with the safety regulations of the particular country (Type H05W-F, 2G or 3G, 0.75 or 1 mm<sup>2</sup> should be used).
- You might like to save the package box and packing material for shipping the display.
- The pictures are for reference only. Actual items may vary upon shipment.

### 1.3 Preparing for the Installation


- Due to the high power consumption, always use the plug exclusively designed for this product. If an extended line is required, please consult your service agent.
- The product should be installed on a flat surface to avoid tipping. The distance between the back of the product and the wall should be maintained for proper ventilation. Avoid installing the product in the kitchen, bathroom or any other places with high humidity so as not to shorten the service life of the electronic components.
- The product can normally operate only under 3600m in altitude. In installations at altitudes above 3600m, some abnormalities may be experienced.

### **1.4 Wall Mounting Installation**


To mount this display to a wall, you will have to obtain a standard wall-mounting kit (commercially available). We recommend using a mounting interface that complies with TUV-GS and/or UL1678 standard in North America.

To wall-mount the interactive display, screw the mounting bracket to the VESA holes at the rear of the interactive display.




#### Warning:

 Do not press too hard on the LCD panel or edge of the frame, as this may cause the device to malfunction.

- Avoid the wall-mounting kit to block the ventilation holes on the back of the display.
- Secure the interactive display on a solid wall strong enough to bear its weight.
- Lay a protective sheet on a table, which was wrapped around the display when it was packaged, beneath the screen surface so as not to scratch the screen face.
- Ensure you have all accessories for mounting this display (wall mount, ceiling mount, etc).
- Follow the instructions that come with the base mounting kit. Failure to follow correct mounting procedures could result in damage to the equipment or injury to the user or installer. Product warranty does not cover damage caused by improper installation.




### 1.4.2 Mounting the Interactive Display on the Wall

To mount the interactive display on the wall, you need the following items:




1 Drill eight small holes on the mounting location with the length and width 55mm x 10mm respectively.


- For the wall-mounting kit, use M6 mounting screws (having a length 10 mm longer than the thickness of the mounting bracket) and tighten them securely.
- Unit without base weight: IFP-6502=39.0 kg / IFP-7502=50.6 kg / IFP-8602=66.0 kg. The equipment and its associated mounting means still remain secure during the test. For use only with UL Listed Wall Mount Bracket with minimum weight/load: IFP-6502=48.8 kg / IFP-7502=62.7 kg / IFP-8602=81.2 kg.



2 Insert a plastic anchor into each hole.




3 Secure the wall mount with the eight supplied screws through the washers into the eight installed anchors on the wall.




4 Align and hook the dual wall mount on the interactive display to the wall mount.


Dual Wall Mount x 2

To allow heat to disperse, leave space between surrounding objects as shown in the diagram below.

# 1.5 Installing the Wi-Fi Module

To use wireless connectivity, you need to install the Wi-Fi module to the interactive display.

1 Remove the two screws from the Wi-Fi module slot cover.



#### Note:

- Keep clearances around the interactive display according to the minimum dimensions as illustrated.
- Never cover the ventilation holes or insert anything into the housing.
- Do not place the interactive display in a confined space, such as a cabinet or imbedded closet. Place the display on a sturdy, level surface and make sure an appropriate ventilation is provided.




Make sure the power cord of the interactive display is disconnected before the installation.


2 Remove the Wi-Fi module slot cover.



With the antenna connectors facing out, install the Wi-Fi module into its slot in the interactive display. Secure the Wi-Fi module to the interactive display with the two screws.




4 Connect the antenna to either of the antenna connectors on the Wi-Fi module and secure it by rotating the antenna clockwise.



5 Repeat step 4 for the second antenna.







 While the interactive display is powered on and you press the keyboard button, the **POWER** button LED indicator blinks red once and then turns back blue.

### 1.7.2 Inserting the Batteries in the Remote Control

The remote control is powered by two 1.5V AAA batteries. To install or replace batteries:

- 1 Unlatch and then remove the battery compartment cover.
- 2 Align the batteries according to the (+) and (-) indications inside the battery compartment.
- **3** Replace the battery compartment cover.



### 1.7.3 Handling the Remote Control

- Do not subject to strong shock.
- Do not allow water or other liquid to splash the remote control. If the remote control gets wet, wipe it dry immediately.
- Avoid exposure to heat and steam.
- Other than to install the batteries, do not open the remote control.

### **A** Caution:

The incorrect use of batteries can result in leaks or bursting. Be sure to follow these instructions:


- Place "AAA" batteries matching the (+) and (-) signs on each battery to the (+) and (-) signs of the battery compartment.
- Do not mix battery types.
- Do not combine new batteries with used ones. It causes shorter life or leakage of batteries.
- Remove the dead batteries immediately to prevent them from liquid leaking in the battery compartment. Don't touch exposed battery acid, as it can damage your skin.

- If you do not intend to use the remote control for a long period, remove the batteries.
- The remote control may not function properly when the remote control sensor on this display is under direct sunlight or strong illumination, or when there is an obstacle in the path of signal transmission.

### 1.7.4 Operating Range of the Remote Control

Point the top of the remote control toward the display's remote control sensor (on the left or right side) when pressing a button.

When using the remote control, the distance from the remote control to the sensor on the display should be less than 8m/26ft, and the horizontal and vertical angles should be less than 30°.




# **CHAPTER 2: MAKING CONNECTIONS**

### 2.1 Connecting the Power

#### Note:

- To operate the interactive display, ensure to use the correct power cord that matches the power outlet in your region.
  - 1 Connect one end of the power cord to the AC IN connector on the interactive display.
  - 2 Connect the other end of the power cord to a power outlet or a power supply.
  - 3 Set the **Main Power** switch to ON.



#### Caution:


- Make sure that the interactive display is not connected to the power outlet before making any connections.
   Connecting cables while the power is ON may cause electric shock or personal injury.
- When unplugging the power cord, hold the power cord by the plug head. Never pull by the cord.

### 2.2 Connecting a Computer or Portable Device

### 2.2.1 Using VGA (D-Sub) Input


Connect one end of a VGA cable to the VGA connector of the interactive display and the other end of a VGA cable to the VGA OUT connector of the computer.

For audio input, connect one end of an audio cable to the AUDIO IN connector of the interactive display and the other end of an audio cable to the AUDIO OUT connector of the computer.




### 2.2.2 Using RS232 Input

Connect one end of a RS232 serial cable to the RS232 connector of the interactive display and the other end of an RS232 serial cable to the RS232 connector of the computer.



### 2.2.3 Using HDMI Input

Connect one end of an HDMI cable to the HDMI IN 1, HDMI IN 2, or HDMI IN 3 connector of the interactive display and the other end of an HDMI cable to the HDMI OUT connector of the computer.



### 2.2.4 Using the Touch Module


Interactive display has touch screen functionality which allows you to connect a computer to the display and control the computer's interface via touch gestures on the display. To use this touch screen function, connect the USB cable to the TOUCH 1 or TOUCH 2 port of the display and a computer.

In addition, perform the following connection:

- For TOUCH 1, connect one end of the HDMI cable to the HDMI IN 1 or HDMI IN 2 port of the display and the other end of the HDMI cable to the HDMI OUT port of the computer.
- For TOUCH 2, connect one end of the HDMI cable or VGA cable to the HDMI IN 3 port or VGA port of the display and the other end of the HDMI cable or the VGA cable to the HDMI OUT port or VGA OUT port of the computer respectively.





  - One-touch point for Windows 2000/XP/Vista/CE 6.0 and macOS.

- Certain touch gestures, such as zoom-in, zoom-out and rotate, may not work depending on the application or software your computer supports.







### 2.6 Connecting USB Interface Devices

Connect a USB interface device to USB2.0 or USB3.0 ports of the interactive display.



### 2.7 Connecting Audio Equipment

For digital audio output, connect one end of an audio cable to the SPDIF connector of the interactive display and the other end of an audio cable to the SPDIF IN connector of the audio device.



# **CHAPTER 3: USING THE INTERACTIVE DISPLAY**

### 3.1 Turning on the Power


- Plug the power cord to a power outlet or power supply.
- 2 Set the Main Power switch to ON.
- 3 Press the <sup>()</sup> button to turn the interactive display on.

When the interactive display is turned on, press the **(b)** button to turn off the interactive display.

#### Note:

 The interactive display still consumes power as long as the power cord is connected to the power outlet. Disconnect the power cord to completely cut off power.

### 3.2 Selecting the Input Source Signal



#### Note:

 After pressing the **Input** button or swiping up from the bottom edge of the screen, the General Setting OSD menu will be displayed on the screen.








### 3.3 Adjusting the Volume



Press the VOL- or VOL+ button to adjust the volume level.

### 3.4 Using Freeze Function



Press the **Blue** button to freeze the screen image but still continue real-time playback until the image is unfreeze. The freeze control bar  $(\bigcirc \bigcirc \bigcirc \times)$  and the  $\bigcirc$  icon appear on the screen.

While the screen freeze is activated, you can perform the following operations:

- Q: Zoom in on the image.
- Q: Zoom out on the image.
- Display the screen image in its original ratio.
- X: Close the freeze control bar and unfreeze.

The screen image displays the elapsed real-time playback image when screen freeze is deactivated.

#### Note:

 After pressing the VOL- or VOL+ button, the volume menu is displayed on the screen automatically.





### 3.7 Using the On-Screen Keyboard


Whenever you need to input text, an on-screen keyboard opens automatically. Touch the keys on the screen as you would press the keys on a connected keyboard. You can also relocate the on-screen keyboard by holding and dragging the keyboard by the icon to the desired location on the screen. To close the on-screen keyboard, press **v**.



## **CHAPTER 4: USING THE SYSTEM**

### 4.1 About the Home Screen

After you power on the system, you will see the Home screen. On the Home screen, you can view the current date and time, access the Assistive menu and various apps, check system status, and remote code.

#### Note:

 In Android mode, if no touch activity is detected within 15 minutes, the device will prompt to shut down for energy saving purposes. Refer to page 53. If no action is taken, the device will shut down automatically after 10 seconds.

### 4.2 Using the Assistive Menu

The Assistive menu O can be accessed on either side of the interactive display. For more convenient access, you can touch and hold on the Assistive menu icon to slide it up or down. Assistive menu icons are always visible on the screen regardless of your location in the user interface.

To use the Assistive menu, do the following:

1 Touch the O icon on either side of the interactive display.

The Assistive menu opens.

- 2 Touch any of the following Assistive menu items:
  - Source I: Selects an input source among Android, HDMI1, HDMI2, HDMI3, and VGA.

- Back <: Returns to the previous screen.

#### Note:

- Back function is available only if the source is Android.
- Home in: Accesses the Home screen.
- To reopen: Touch the app.
- To close: Swipe the app to the left or to the right.
- To close all apps: Touch d Clean All Processes (#) where "#" is the number of opened apps.

Note:

- Recently used apps function is available only if the source is Android.
- More Tools •••: Touch 🕒 to open SpotLight for emphasising an area on the screen, touch 🖾 to open the ScreenShot capture tool and to capture a screenshot, or touch 🛣 to open CountDown timer to count down time for events.
- Annotation App 2: Opens the Annotation app and enters writing mode.

Note:

- The Annotation app cannot be accessed while using the Meetboard app.
- **3** To close the Assistive menu touch **4** or touch anywhere on the screen.

4.3 Using the Meetboard App

**Meetboard** is an interactive app that enables you to make drawings for demonstrating ideas on the display. The drawings can be saved to the device memory, connected portable disk, or cloud storage, or easily shared via QR code or email.

To use the **Meetboard** app, do the following:

1 Touch the 🖲 icon on the Home screen or the 🎦 icon on the Apps screen.


The **Meetboard** app opens.



**2** Draw directly on the board with the default settings for colour, marker width, pen type (pencil, marker, and brush), and background colour or touch any of the following icons to modify the default settings:



- *I*: Sets up the colour and width for the pen while handwriting or while using the touch pen.



- Touch => & Background: Sets up the colour of the background. To set an image on the background, touch **Custom** and select a background image from the internal memory or from a portable disk. When the background is modified, touch **OK** to confirm. Touch **Cancel** if you want to keep the current writing board background.





- Touch ≡ > Import: Imports an image or PDF file on the writing board from the internal memory or a portable disk. After importing the image, you can drag the image around the screen, use your hands or control circles around the image to zoom-in, zoom-out, and rotate as needed.



- **3** To control the drawing on the board, use the following actions:
  - 📑: Selects part of the image that you can drag around the screen. You can change the selected image colour, use your hands or control circles around the fraction of the image to zoom-in, zoom-out, and rotate as needed.
  - Erase: Put your fist or palm on the board and move to the area that needs to be erased or touch <> to switch to erase mode and then touch the area on the screen that needs to be erased.

- To review the current position of the content on the screen, touch 🖑 again.



- i : Clears the entire board.
- <a: Reverses the most recent action on the writing board.
- A: Restores the most recent action on the writing board.
- +: Adds a new page.
- < : Moves to the previous page if there are multiple pages in the file.
- >: Moves to the next page if there are multiple pages in the file.

#### Note:

- Touch on the page count (3/59) to thumbnail all pages and remove unnecessary pages.
- 4 After the drawing is finalised, touch any of the following:
  - $\equiv > \mathbb{T}$  Save: Select a storage and path where to save the drawing and then name the drawing.
  - ≡ > □ Export: Export the drawing as an image file or PDF file. You are prompted to select the storage, path, and name for the drawing.

- => A Cloud Storage: Save the drawing to your cloud storage. You are prompted to select a drive (Google Drive or OneDrive). If you are logging in to your cloud storage for the first time, you are prompted to enter your credentials. Follow the on-screen instructions to configure the access to your cloud storage.

In addition, you can select to always use your default cloud storage account and always save the file with the default name.

#### Note:

• To save to the cloud storage, make sure the interactive display is connected to the Internet.

- ≡ > Send Email: Emails the drawing. If you are sending the drawing by email for the first time, you are prompted to configure your email settings. Follow the on-screen instructions to complete the configuration.

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After the settings are configured, return to the **Meetboard** app and send the drawing by email. The drawing is added as an attachment.

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#### Note:

- To send an email, make sure the interactive display is connected to the Internet.
- Image: Displays a QR code on the screen that directs to the online location where the drawing can be downloaded to any portable device that is connected to the same Wi-Fi with the interactive display.



#### Note:

- The interactive display can be accessed by scanning the QR code from other devices only if the display and all the other devices are connected to the same domain or wireless access point.
- Touch the QR code again to make it larger on the screen if needed.
- ≡ > → Open: Opens previously saved file from the storage device. You are prompted to select a storage device and the path where the file is saved.

### 4.4 Using the Annotation App

**Annotation** is an app that provides a more fluid discussion of visual images by annotating anywhere on the display.

#### Note:

• The Annotation app cannot be accessed while using the Meetboard app.

To use Annotation app, do the following:

1 In Assistive menu, touch  $\mathscr{Q}$ .

The system enters to the writing mode and displays the Annotation control bar on the screen.




- 2 Draw directly on the screen with the default settings for colour and pen type. To change the default pen colour, touch sort or repeatedly until you find the desired pen colour.
- **3** After the drawing is finalised, touch any of the following:
  - - Erases the drawing. To erase part of the drawing, use your fist or palm.
  - R: Save the drawing. The drawing is automatically saved to the device memory.
- 4 To exit the **Annotation** app, touch **X**.

### 4.5 Using the Finder app

Finder enables you to manage files that are saved in the internal memory or in any accessible external storages.

On the **Finder** Home screen, you can access the content of the storage devices (internal memory or portable devices), access the file categories, perform search, review file or folder details, content of the storage, its folder and files, and perform operations with files and folders using the control bar.



To start using the **Finder** app, do the following:

- On the Home screen, touch is or on the Apps screen, touch is.
   The Finder Home screen opens.
- 2 Touch any of the following:
  - meta: Sorts the content by name, type, size, or time.

- I Displays content side by side.
- E: Displays content in a list.
- Selects individual items or all visible items for copy (1), paste (1), cut (3), deletion (1), rename (3) (only available for individual item), or for sending to another storage device . Touch
   to select all items or touch × to exit the selection mode.
- 🖙: Adds a folder.
- **3** Touch **E** to exit the **Finder** app.

### 4.6 Accessing Apps

Some apps, such as **Meetboard**, **Finder**, and **ScreenShare Pro**, are accessible directly from the Home screen. Other apps that are installed to the system can be accessed through the Apps screen.

To access the Apps screen, do the following:

1 On the Home screen, touch .

The Apps screen opens.



- 2 On the Apps screen, touch any of the following apps:
  - Browser <a>[6]</a>/Chromium <a>[6]</a>: Opens the web browser for surfing the Internet.

#### Note:

- Make sure your interactive display is connected to the Internet.
- **Calculator :** Opens the on-screen calculator and then you can perform basic mathematical calculations.
- Cloud Drive .: Configures cloud drive access settings. These settings may be prompted also in other apps that require cloud connection.
- Finder 🧾: Manages your files. Refer to page 47.
- K-9 Mail :: Configures email settings. These settings may be prompted also in other apps that require sending files by email.

- Keeper 👩: Optimises system performance easily.



- **Meetboard** Copens a whiteboard application for brainstorming and more. Refer to pages 43-46.
- Screenlock :: Sets a password to protect against undesired screen access.

Note:

- If you forgot the lock screen password, press "Input" + "0" + "2" + "1" + "4" buttons on the remote control.
- ScreenShare Pro :: Mirrors the screen of your portable device to the interactive display and more.
- Settings 🔯: Views and configures system settings. Refer to pages 51-52.
- WPS Office : Views PDF files, opens and edits different files including Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, Excel, and text files. You can also create new spreadsheets, presentations, memos, and documents.



### 4.7 Using the ScreenShare Pro App

With the **ScreenShare Pro** app, you can mirror the display's screen on your portable device for hands-on annotation, mirror the screen of your device on the display, or use your device as a remote control for the display.

To start using the ScreenShare Pro app, do the following:

- 1 Make sure your portable device and the interactive display are connected to the same wireless network.
- 2 On the Home screen, touch 💮 or on the Apps screen, touch **I**.

The ScreenShare Pro Home screen opens.

- 3 On the Home screen, touch User Guide (
- 4 Scan the QR code to access the **ScreenShare Pro** sender download page and then install the sender to your portable device.
- 5 Connect your portable device and the interactive display to the same wireless access point.
- 6 Open the **ScreenShare Pro** app on your portable device and enter the remote code that is visible on the interactive display screen.

After the connection is established, the following screen opens on your portable device:

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- 7 Touch any of the following:
  - Media: Plays media files from your portable device on the interactive display.
  - Photo: Displays photos from your portable device on the interactive display.

  - Desktop Sync: Mirrors the fully functional interactive display screen on your portable device.
  - Screen share: Mirrors your portable device's screen on the interactive display.
  - In iOS, swipe the screen up to open Control Center > Screen Mirroring and select ScreenShare Pro. To stop mirroring, touch Stop Mirroring.

 In Android, touch Start in Screen share panel to start mirroring the screen. To stop mirroring, touch \$\sum\_2\$.



#### Note:

 The ScreenShare Pro supports Chromecast, AirPlay, and Miracast. Make sure to turn on the buttons in the Settings menu.

### 4.8 Configuring System Settings

In Settings menu, you can configure various system settings.

To access the Settings menu, do the following:

1 On the Home screen, touch 🐵 > 🔯.

The Settings menu opens.

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2 Configure any of the following settings:

#### Wireless and networks:

- Wi-Fi: Connects to an available wireless access point. Enter the access password if prompted.
- **Ethernet**: Connects to LAN through a wired connection. Depending on the web server configuration, you may need to configure the network settings manually or automatically (DHCP).
- Wireless hotspot: Shares interactive display's Internet connection to other devices through hotspot.
- Bluetooth: Connects to other Bluetooth devices.
- More > VPN: Sets up and manages virtual private networks for safe and secure online communication.

Share:

- SAMBA Service: Configures SAMBA settings for sharing file and print services.

Device:

- **Display**: Configures external source display settings (HDMI output) and sets pixel shift to prevent "burn-in" effect.
- Storage: Manages both internal and external storages.
- Sound: Manages touch sound and sound output settings.
- Apps: Manges apps that are installed to the interactive display.

Personal:

- Security: Manages credentials.
- Language & input: Sets system language and configures keyboard and input settings.
- Power Setting: Configures booting options, system power options, and boot-time scheduling.
- **Password**: Sets or changes the screen lock password. If you forgot the screen lock password, refer to page 49.
- Input Setting: Renames input sources.
- **Other Settings**: Configures various settings: floating annotation, system dock channel, and note writing.

System:

- Date & Time: Configures date and time related settings.
- About device: Displays device information.
- System Update: Upgrades the system.
- **3** To exit the Settings menu, touch **E**.

### 4.9 Power Setting

In Power Setting menu, you can configure booting options, system power options, and schedule boot-time.

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#### 4.9.1 Booting Options

In Booting Options menu, set the default source at boot up and enable or disable boot on standby.

#### 4.9.1.1 Boot on source

Select the default boot source among:

- Last input: Input source is the same as at last boot.
- Default input: User selected default input source.
- Android: Default boot source is Android.

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#### 4.9.1.2 Boot on standby

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#### Note:

• In Standby mode, the **POWER** button is flashing red and blue alternatively.

#### 4.9.2 System Power Options

In System Power Options menu, enable or disable wake on source, shutdown mode, and closing power off reminder.

#### 4.9.2.1 Wake on source

To enable the interactive display to wake up from the shutdown mode when an HDMI or VGA source is detected, check **Enabled (HDMI/VGA inputs can wake up the system)** in (a) > (a) > (b) > Personal > Power Setting > System power options > Wake on source menu.

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#### 4.9.2.2 Shutdown
